Rhythm in Early Years Bongo Playing

In our recent music session, our EY3 learners embarked on an exciting journey into rhythm through bongo exploration, building on their prior understanding of guitar and keyboard sound production. With eager hands and open minds, students delved into the tactile and sonic world of rhythm-making, discovering how touch and timing can produce expressive sounds.

The session truly showcased the IB Learner Profile attribute of being Inquirers, as our young musicians asked questions, experimented with different beat patterns, and explored new ways to express themselves musically.

Aligned with the Approaches to Learning (ATL) skill of creative thinking, students used imagination and rhythm to craft original patterns on the bongos. They also collaborated to compose short rhythmic sequences, fostering creativity, cooperation, and a deeper appreciation of musical expression.



Exploring Movement Through Music

Our little dancers from EYP 1 had their very first dance class today, and it was filled with giggles, wiggles, and joyful energy! Through the topic Exploring Movement Through Music, children engaged in fun activities that introduced them to basic movements, rhythm, and spatial awareness. Demonstrating the attributes of Communicators and Risk-Takers, our young learners expressed themselves freely and confidently, embracing new experiences with open minds. 
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Tout sur moi French cube Activity!

The session provided a meaningful platform for students to enhance their understanding of French culture and history while fostering creativity, collaboration, and intercultural awareness.







Grade 7 Learners Explore Agility and Teamwork through Traditional Kho-Kho




Entrepreneurial Management- Business Plan




As part of their first Hindi unit, "स्वास्थ्य" (Health), Grade 9 students at D.Y. Patil International School actively engaged in a vibrant classroom presentation that explored the concept of health and its relevance in daily life. The students discussed the definition of health, reasons for poor health, preventive measures, and practical ways to maintain a healthy lifestyle. Using a variety of tools, including charts, posters, digital presentations, role-playing, and group discussions, students showcased their creativity and understanding of the topic. They focused on critical aspects like personal hygiene, balanced diet, physical fitness, and mental wellness. Some groups raised awareness about lifestyle diseases and unhealthy habits, offering practical suggestions to prevent them.

This activity promoted critical thinking, teamwork, and effective communication skills. Students also developed their research abilities while collecting relevant facts and examples. Their confidence grew as they presented in front of their peers, and their ability to express complex ideas in Hindi improved significantly. Activities like these enrich learning by bridging the gap between academics and real-life application, helping students become more informed, responsible, and balanced individuals.



Edible Cell Model A Delicious Dive into Biology

As part of their Biology unit on cells, Grade 6 students, under the guidance of Ms. Prithvika, engaged in an exciting hands-on activity to explore the structure and function of cell organelles in both plant and animal cells. Students creatively constructed Edible Cell Models using a variety of everyday food items commonly found in the kitchen.

To represent different organelles, they used bread as the base (cell membrane or cell wall), chocolate for the nucleus, jelly and jam to represent the cytoplasm, and other ingredients like sprinkles, candies, and fruit pieces to symbolize structures such as mitochondria, chloroplasts, and the endoplasmic reticulum. Each item was thoughtfully selected and positioned to reflect the distinct shape, size, and placement of organelles within the cell.

This interactive and engaging model enabled students to visualize and better understand complex biological concepts, particularly the function and spatial arrangement of cell components. The activity not only reinforced their textbook learning but also nurtured creativity, critical thinking, and presentation skills.

The students' models were a wonderful fusion of science and imagination—bringing learning to life in the most delightful (and edible!) way.



Respiratory System Model Breathing Life into Learning

As part of their Biology unit on 'Respiration', Grade 7 students explored the structure and function of the human respiratory system through a hands-on model-making activity. Guided by inquiry and creativity, students designed and constructed innovative working models to represent the key components and mechanisms involved in breathing.

Using everyday materials such as balloons, straws, cardboard, rubber bands, and plastic bottles, students skillfully recreated parts of the respiratory system including the lungs, diaphragm, trachea, bronchi, and alveoli. Many models included 3D elements or movable parts that demonstrated how air enters the body, how the diaphragm contracts and relaxes, and how gas exchange occurs in the lungs.

By simulating the breathing mechanism, students gained a deeper understanding of how the respiratory system supports cellular respiration and maintains vital functions in the human body. The activity encouraged not just scientific learning, but also collaboration, innovation, and presentation skills.

These models truly brought biology to life—turning theory into tangible learning and helping students visualize the inner workings of one of the body's most essential systems.



Bridging Theory with Practice Mastering Bank Reconciliation in the Classroom

In the dynamic world of accounting education, real-life application is key to deep understanding. This month, students in the senior accounting class had the opportunity to move beyond textbooks and into practical learning as they explored the topic of bank reconciliation statements. Bank reconciliation is a crucial accounting process that ensures the accuracy of a business's financial records by matching the entries in the cash book with those on the actual bank statement. While the concept may seem theoretical at first, students experienced firsthand how vital and relevant it is. To bring this topic to life, students worked with real and simulated bank statements alongside their own manually prepared cash books.


This allowed them to identify common discrepancies such as unpresented cheques, direct debits, bank charges, and timing differences. Through guided analysis and discussion, students learned how to adjust the cash book and prepare accurate reconciliation statements—just as professional accountants would in a real-world setting. The use of actual bank documents helped students recognize the practical challenges businesses face in maintaining accurate records and fostered skills in attention to detail, critical thinking, and financial accuracy. It was a rewarding and enriching experience that demonstrated the value of hands-on learning. We look forward to further integrating practical exercises in future lessons, reinforcing the link between classroom learning and professional financial practices.



A-Level Business Students Crack the Code of Product Innovation

Recently, our A-Level Business students took part in an immersive classroom activity designed to bring the theory of New Product Development (NPD) to life. Through an engaging method known as Sequence CRD, students were handed a series of clue or sequence cards, each representing a stage or strategic task commonly followed by big companies when launching new products. Working in teams, students applied their classroom knowledge to think critically and arrange these cards in the correct chronological order of the NPD process. Each stage—from generating innovative ideas to product launch—was paired with a real-world activity, allowing students to connect academic concepts with industry practice.

This hands-on exercise encouraged collaboration, strategic thinking, and problem-solving. Students had to justify their card arrangement and explain the purpose behind each activity, simulating how real companies make tough decisions in the early phases of product creation. “It was like stepping into the shoes of product managers,” said one enthusiastic participant. “We finally saw how everything we learn in theory actually applies in the business world.” The activity served as a valuable lesson in bridging classroom learning with practical business insight. Not only did students gain a deeper understanding of how products make their way from concept to market, but they also honed essential workplace skills that will serve them well in their future careers.



Highlighting Global Issues through Art: A Creative Exploration by IB DP 1 English Students

In a compelling and thought-provoking initiative, IB DP 1 English students at D Y Patil International School, Worli, demonstrated their understanding of global issues through the powerful mediums of political cartoons and posters. Drawing inspiration from renowned artists and activists Liza Donnelly and Barbara Kruger, students combined visual expression with critical thinking to address pressing topics such as feminism, gender inequality, and social justice.

Using satire, symbolism, and striking design elements, students shed light on themes including the marginalization of women, unequal pay, restrictive gender roles, and the silencing of female voices. Their creative responses to Donnelly's insightful illustrations and Kruger's bold, declarative style revealed a thoughtful engagement with the ongoing global discourse on gender equity and women's rights.

This exploration not only deepened students' awareness of contemporary social issues but also sharpened their skills in visual analysis, interpretation, and persuasive communication. The initiative served as a testament to how art and language can powerfully intersect—empowering students to become informed, empathetic, and socially responsible global citizens.

Futuristic Functions of a Human Resource Manager

Creating presentations, especially with the IB learner profile in mind, is crucial for developing well-rounded students. These profiles emphasize attributes like being inquirers, knowledgeable, thinkers, communicators, principled, open-minded, caring, risk-takers, balanced, and reflective. When students create presentations, they actively engage with these attributes, fostering skills that extend beyond academics.

1. Presenting information effectively: Students learn to structure their ideas logically and use visual aids (like PPTs). and adapt their language for different audiences.

2. Engaging the audience: They practice conveying their message with clarity and enthusiasm, making their presentations more impactful.

3. Practicing active listening: While presenting, they also develop the ability to listen to feedback and respond thoughtfully.

4. Critical analysis: Creating a presentation requires students to research and analyze information. and synthesize their findings.

5. Logical reasoning: They learn to structure arguments, support their claims with evidence, and present a coherent narrative.

Thus, this particular task of creating a presentation based on “The Functions and Skills of a Human Resource Manager” was allotted to the student of the IBCP 1. In order to reinforce the teaching-learning concept of this topic, the student presented her understanding with ease and confidence.

The student was able to explain the functions of planning, controlling, directing, and organizing with a detailed explanation that facilitated deeper understanding, as it was supported by the skills needed by the human resource manager to support these functions.

Empowering Educators: A Purposeful Whole-School PD Day for IB Readiness

At D Y Patil International School, Worli, our commitment to reflective practice, collaboration, and excellence in teaching was exemplified through a powerful and enriching Professional Development (PD) day that brought together educators from both the Primary and Secondary schools. With the upcoming IB Evaluation on the horizon, this whole-school PD was thoughtfully designed around four foundational pillars of the IB framework—Purpose, Environment, Learning, and Professional Development Planning (PDP 1)—ensuring alignment, coherence, and collective preparation across the continuum.

The first session focused on Environment, where educators engaged deeply with the question: How can we create physical and virtual spaces that inspire inquiry and inclusivity? In Secondary, Mr. Himmat led a dynamic session exploring how thoughtfully designed environments promote student ownership and engagement. Simultaneously, in Primary, Ms. Archana, the PYP Coordinator, facilitated a session that encouraged teachers to reimagine classroom environments that foster curiosity, well-being, and independence. Both sessions saw active participation and rich sharing across divisions.

The next session centred on Purpose, where teachers reflected on the “why” of education—revisiting core beliefs, classroom actions, and the impact they strive to create. In Secondary, Ms. Divya led a reflective and thought-provoking session that helped teachers explore how purpose-driven practice enhances authenticity and student agency. In Primary, Ms. Aishwarya and Ms. Shipra guided educators through similar reflections relevant to early and primary years education. Teachers from both divisions found opportunities for cross-collaboration and shared insights.

The Learning session—central to the teaching profession—was facilitated by Ms. Meenakshi and Mr. Ganesh in the Secondary School, and by Ms. Beliza in the Primary School. These sessions focused on how planning, assessment, and reflection align with IB principles and empower learners. Teachers explored practical strategies, shared successful practices, and discussed ways to build ownership and engagement in their classrooms.

The final session, PDP 1, was conducted by Ms. Zainab with Secondary School educators, focusing on planning for professional growth and development. The session offered a space for educators to reflect on their roles and goals, align their practices with the IB philosophy, and develop purposeful action plans to strengthen their learning journeys.

What made the day particularly impactful was its educator-led structure—by teachers, for teachers. This model fostered collaboration, celebrated internal expertise, and cultivated a culture of professional trust and shared ownership across the school.

All in all, the PD day was a unified, purposeful, and energising experience, equipping teachers from both Primary and Secondary with fresh perspectives, actionable strategies, and a renewed sense of mission. As we prepare for the upcoming IB Evaluation, we do so with alignment, clarity, and confidence—continuing our journey of excellence as one IB World School.
