Through this exploration, learners also developed their Thinking Skills, an essential Approaches to Learning (ATL) skill, as they analyzed, compared, and reflected on different types of transportation. This interactive experience not only enriched their knowledge but also sparked curiosity about the world around them, making learning truly meaningful and fun!



Exploring Colours Through Play and Discovery

1. Making Connections: Text to Self

2. Word Work: Roll and Read

3. Summarizing with SWBST

Our young readers are becoming master storytellers too! They're learning to summarize stories using the SWBST method:

- Somebody (main character)
- Wanted (the character's goal)
- But (the problem)
- So (how the character tries to solve it)
- Then (the resolution)

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This technique helps them understand the key elements of stories and retell them in their own words.

These activities are not only boosting their reading skills but also fostering a love for books. It's wonderful to see their enthusiasm grow with each session! Our young readers have been making great strides in their literacy skills through fun and interactive guided reading sessions.






















States of Matter: A Hands- on Discovery

A Dive into Descriptive Writing

This week, our young writers embarked on an exciting journey into the world of descriptive writing, using their imaginations to paint vivid pictures with words. They explored a variety of scenarios—a stormy night filled with flashing lightning and howling winds, a peaceful meadow bathed in golden sunlight, or a bustling carnival alive with laughter and the scent of sweet treats. The activity commenced with the learners closing their eyes and immersed themselves in these imagined settings, jotting down sensory words and phrases that captured the sights, sounds, smells, and feelings of their scenes. Phrases like crisp autumn air and thunder rumbling in the distance laid the foundation for their writing, helping them engage all five senses.

Students silently built upon each other's ideas, expanding and refining descriptions to create even richer imagery in the Chalk Talk activity. A simple phrase like ocean waves crashing evolved into a salty breeze tickling my face as foamy waves danced along the shore, demonstrating how small details bring writing to life. Using these sensory words and collaborative ideas, students crafted beautifully detailed sentences, transforming their thoughts into vivid descriptions that transported readers straight into their imagined worlds.

This activity strengthened their ability to create engaging narratives and also reinforced the essential writing skill of showing, not just telling. By unlocking the magic of words, our young writers discovered how to make their stories come alive!

IUCN Red List and Its Impact on conservation

Biodiversity plays a crucial role in maintaining ecological balance, and understanding its significance is a fundamental aspect of the IBDP Year 1 Environmental Systems and Societies (ESS) course. As part of their curriculum, students explored the IUCN Red List, a global inventory that categorizes species based on their risk of extinction.

The students examined how species evolve and how human activities influence their populations. Engaging discussions centered around real-world case studies, such as the reintroduction of wolves into Yellowstone National Park and its transformative impact on the ecosystem. As they explored the negative consequences of human actions on species diversity, students shared concerns about their favorite animals and plants that are now endangered due to deforestation and climate change.

To deepen their understanding, students conducted an independent research exercise. Each student selected three species from the IUCN Red List and presented their findings, discussing their conservation status and ecological importance. Their presentations showcased a diverse range of rare and fascinating species—from the Pika, a small, furry mammal found in China's mountains, to apex predators like the Cheetah and Snow Leopard.

Some particularly intriguing discoveries included:

- The Axolotl a Mexican amphibian that remains in its larval stage throughout its life.
- The Chinese Pangolin an endangered species hunted for its scales.
- The Hoatzin a bird with a distinct appearance and an unusual odor that deters predators.
- The Dracula Fish a rare, completely transparent fish with a unique protruding lower jaw.

Through this engaging and thought-provoking activity, students gained valuable insights into conservation efforts and discussed ways to preserve biodiversity and protect endangered species. Their enthusiasm and curiosity made the sessions both educational and inspiring, reinforcing the importance of environmental stewardship.

- Risk-Takers: The EE pushes students beyond their comfort zones, encouraging them to explore complex ideas and unfamiliar disciplines.
- Balanced: Effective time management ensures that students balance their EE workload with other academic commitments.
